Objectives and Schedule

Objectives

- ♦ To create a crime-free and drug-free campus environment that allows for safe learning and living
- ♦ To instill positive values, foster good citizenship, and build self-confidence among students
- ♦ To enable college and university students to become resources for preventing criminal and destructive activity both on campus and in the surrounding community

Expectations

- ♦ Educate students and campus authorities about CCW and its benefits
- ♦ Have a core group of at least six students
- ♦ Ensure a law enforcement representative will provide a minimum amount of consultation support to the students
- ♦ Have an advisor chosen and have him/her complete a census survey at the beginning and end of each semester
- ♦ Provide the students with an opportunity to assess and/or address safety and other crime prevention issues in the school
- ♦ Utilize the components applicable to the particular school:
 1. Campus Watch
 2. Safety Escort Services and Campus Patrols
 3. Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention
 4. Self-defense Training
 5. Lifesaving (First Aid/CPR)
 6. Property Protection
 7. Safe Crime Reporting
 8. Peer Mediation and Counseling
 9. Hate Crime Prevention
 10. Action Projects

Schedule

The following are in addition to **MONTHLY CONFERENCE CALLS**:

- ♦ September—Core Group will work to recruit extended group members and raise awareness of the program. Returning CCW groups will educate freshmen and transfer students on the available components and how they can be utilized.
- ♦ October—Core Group and advisor will decide which components are best for the campus and begin tailoring them to their environment or, if program is continuing from previous year, review components and decide if any changes or additions are appropriate. Submit census survey and MOU.
- ♦ November—Components will have been organized and launched on campuses. Core Groups will decide which members will attend the National Youth Crime Prevention Conference and begin finding funds with which to attend the conference.
- ♦ December—Components will be in place and Core Groups will work to promote awareness of the components.
- ♦ February—Core Group representatives will attend the National Youth Crime Prevention Conference, and will participate in CCW workshops and other events to share information and ideas about CCW programs and improvements.

CCW Objectives and Schedules 2

- ♦ March—Members should have good understanding of which components are working well and which are not and will make a report to CCW of America so that problems can be improved upon.
- ♦ May—Core Groups will decide how to end the year and whether any of the components will be carried through the summer for summer school students to utilize.
- ♦ June—CCW Advisors will make a final report on the events of the year to CCW of America including all achievements, problems, and ideas that have come up over the course of the year.
- ♦ July—CCW will begin working with advisors on programs for the next school year.
- ♦ August—Preparation for new school year will continue.

Training

- ♦ Core Groups are encouraged to develop appropriate training through local resources.
- ♦ National Training cannot be offered without compensation for travel and materials.
- ♦ CCW materials, including the CCW Handbook and other curricular literature, are available at no cost upon request.
- ♦ CCW workshops will be offered at various conferences that will be posted on the website.

Recruitment Protocol for New CCW Programs

- Obtain appropriate materials, such as CCW Handbook, Memorandum of Understanding, and supplemental literature, from CCW National Headquarters.
- Develop Core Group of at least 6 students and a school official to act as an Advisor.
- Obtain official approval from the college or university and sign the Memorandum of Understanding.
- Fill out the Census Surveys and return them to CCW National Headquarters with the Memorandum of Understanding.
- Determine which components will be used based on the crime statistics of the school and the needs of the students.
- Advertise CCW on campus to recruit extended group members to volunteer for the components such as Escort Services and Campus Patrols.
- Hold Implementation Training to teach extended group members about CCW and how to run its components.
- Continue to advertise the program on campus to increase awareness of its components and how the components can be utilized and to continue to recruit new extended group members.
